

TOUR OF THE RIORDAN MANSION STATE HISTORIC PARK

Saturday, August 29, was a typical sunny morning, a perfect day for a ride to the cooler high country. Mike Cassel would lead the Weilands, Sipruts and Harders to Flagstaff. On our drive up, a C-5 convertible joined our small convoy for a few miles but as we made our halfway pit-stop, they gave us a wave and continued on. At the State Park we were joined by the Follettes, Dobsons and Durbys.

In order to get a sense of Flagstaff's history and gain a respect for the men and women who braved the untamed West to seek their fortunes, a visit to Riordan Mansion is a great place to start. It was donated along with all of its contents in 1985 by Blanche Riordan, the oldest daughter of Michael and Elizabeth, Riordan after her passing. The tour took us back to the turn-of-the-century Arizona When the Atlantic and Pacific Territory. railroad was constructed in the early 1880s through Flagstaff, it opened up the opportunity for shipping lumber. Since Arizona had the largest stand of Ponderosa Pine in the world, the Riordan Brothers quickly became lumber barons, managing the Ayer Lumber Company.

In 1904 the Riordan Brothers, Timothy and Michael, commissioned this 13,000 sq. ft. mansion to be built. They married sisters, Caroline and Elizabeth Metz, who happened to be cousins of the Babbitt family. Now that's keeping it all in the family! Architect Charles Whittlesey, who also designed the El Tovar Hotel, designed this home which has become one of the finest examples of the Arts and Crafts architecture in the West and holds many surprises for the visitor. The Arts and Crafts home celebrated handicrafts encouraged the use of simple forms and natural

materials. The Mansion is actually two identical homes joined by a 1,000 sq. ft. common room known as "the cabin." It is not a log home but Ponderosa Pine Slab Plank left over from the mill. With its 40 rooms, six bathrooms (indoor plumbing), electric lights, central heating, hot and cold running water, large ice boxes in the kitchen and telephones, the Riordan Mansion was technologically and architecturally ahead of its time.

cold running water, large ice boxes in the kitchen and telephones, the Riordan Mansion was technologically and architecturally ahead of its time.

Look up in the Reception Hall and you will see a combination skylight and ventilation system. The glass panes allowed light



to pass through. Opening all the windows in the home and the several levels of glass in the ceiling allowed air to circulate.



Another treasure to see is the photopane windows on display in the Billiard Room. These photographs printed on glass were made by John Hiller, the expedition photographer with John Wesley Powell. There are also stained glass windows with a tulip design throughout the Mansion; their origin remains a mystery.

There are unique pieces of furniture in the Arts and Crafts style, particularly by Gustav Stickley, and rare inlay designed furniture by Harvey Ellis. Both of these men were leaders of the Arts and Crafts movement, and their ideas had an enormous influence on Frank Lloyd Wright. In one of the dining rooms in one of the homes, everything is in an oval shape. An unusual canoe-shaped dining room table was built because the owner wanted to have a table where everyone could see each other and to facilitate conversation.

There are many more treasures in this home and around the grounds, too numerous to mention. For those of you who missed it, take a trip to the high country and enjoy this true diamond of Arizona's history.





UPDATE ON SCC'S SPONSORSHIP AT THE RONALD McDONALD HOUSE

As many of you know, about five years ago our Scottsdale Corvette Club began sponsoring one of the twenty "apartments" at the Phoenix Ronald McDonald House (RMH). The RMH is used by families while one of their children is undergoing medical treatment at the Children's Hospital. Their stay can be anywhere from days to several months, and is provided at little to no cost.

Several of our members were involved with this "adopt a room" project, where we were responsible for fully redecorating (furnishings, painting, bedding, etc.) one of the residential units at the RMH. Our spirited volunteers developed one of their most popular rooms because it had a Corvette theme. There is a wall plaque outside the room reflecting our sponsorship.



Sixteen SCC families donated household items or contributed funds for their purchase. In addition, we had a "painting crew," Kathy Bales, Connie Cassel, Sue Kulczycki, Clare Godsberry, Dorothy Durby and Joann Voss. We also had to have a "moving crew" for all the stuff (the muscle), Mark Bales, Walter Juessen, Mark Shaw, Al Star, and Dwayne Collier. The Club contributed an additional \$1,500 for required purchases, all of which resulted in a spectacular accomplishment.

There was a public ribbon-cutting ceremony on April 13, 2005, for all of the twenty renovated units which were featured on Chanel 3 News.

Since then, our Club has been providing new bedding and other linens on an annual basis, donated from our general funds at a cost of about \$400 per year. We also replaced our donated recliner that had worn out with a brand new one in 2007.

So why are we writing about this now? Well it seems that our great new room is now about five years old and the RMH thinks it could use some updating. To begin with, they have asked for funds (\$500) to purchase additional bedding to match the other rooms,

which we provided in November. But now we will need a volunteer committee to evaluate what else is needed to bring our unit back up to its pristine condition, and then execute on whatever plan is developed. No doubt we will need additional household items, some from donations and some will need to be purchased, and most importantly there will need to be "crews" for whatever creative work needs there are and also for the general labor required. Our new Board will identify a chairperson for this committee, but that person is going to need lots of help, -- so let's get prepared to show our Club spirit for a very worthy cause.









